
Dear Bill:

I received your invitation of May 20 to appear before the Subcommittee on Priorities and Economy in Government of the Joint Economic Committee.

As I considered **the subjects** which you proposed to cover,. it became clear that all of the information your Committee seeks has been presented by me and other **DoD** witnesses, in even greater detail than is expressed in your May 20 letter, to the Senate and House Armed Services and Appropriations Committees, and, to a lesser extent, to the Senate and House Budget Committees, during the FY 1977 President's Budget Hearings. In addition, the FY 1977 Annual Defense Department **Report** to the Congress and the Chairman., JCS' FY 1977 report on the United States Military Posture provide extensive **DoD** positions on many of the subjects in your letter. I believe the published Committee hearings would also include, in great **detail**, information which would be very useful to your Subcommittee.

Because I will be leaving on June 8 for NATO Defense Planning Committee and Nuclear Planning Group meetings in Brussels, I will be unable to testify as you have requested. In any case., as noted above, the information requested is readily available. Dear Don:

This is to invite you to testify before the Subcommittee on Priorities and Economy in Government of the Joint Economic Committee, **June 8, 1976** at **11:00 a.m.** I would also like the Chairman or another spokesman for the Joint Chiefs of Staff to appear with you.

As you know, the Subcommittee has conducted extensive inquiries into the economic issues in defense spending over a period of many years. You took part in some of our inquiries when you were a member of the Joint Economic Committee.

The present inquiry will focus on mission requirements and their relation to the Soviet military threat and to procurement decisions. I think you will agree that the way mission requirements are defined has the most far-reaching influence on decisions about new weapons systems.

I would like you to discuss generally the procedures followed for defining and changing mission requirements, the roles of your office, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the individual services, the relationship of potential military threats to the missions, and how procurement decisions are coordinated with the missions.

It would be helpful if you could illustrate your remarks with specific examples. The Subcommittee is particularly interested in the missions assigned to military airlift, navy sea control, field army air defense, fleet air defense and **anti**armor.

It would aid the Committee if we could have 100 copies of your statement by noon Monday, June 7, 1976. Please send them to Mr. Michael Runde, Joint Economic Committee, Room G-133

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
