MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

F-16 Co-production Status-- UNFORMATION MEMORANDUM SUBJECT:

The attached point paper responds to RAdm Holcomb's inquiry on the status of the F-16 Co-production Program with the European Participating Governments (EPGs) and reported indications that "allies are disenchanted with the F-16 co-production program because of cost overruns".

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F-16 CO-PRODUCTION STATUS

BACKGROUND:

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- Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed Jun 75
 - -- MOU Supplement No. 1 signed Jun 76 readjusted fixed rates of exchange to enable European co-production to be considered on a fair and realistic. b a s i s .

Preliminary Contracts - signed Jun 75 *(amended Jul 76)

Letter of Offer' and Acceptance (LOA) - in preparation, expect signatures early 77.

- MOU commitments by U.S. to European Participating Governments (EPG).
 - -- Offset goal 100% of procurement value of initial EPG purchase of ,348 aircraft.
 - -- USG commitment to provide through co-production,,
 offset equal to:
 - --- 58% of procurement value of initial EPG purchase of 348 aircraft during production of first 998 F-16s: (650 for U.S. and 348 for EPG).
 - --- 80% of procurement value of initial EPG purchase if General Dynamics produces 500 additional F-16s for third country sales.
 - -- Not-to-exceed (NTE) level-line price (\$6.091 million) in MOU is estimate in FY 75 dollars and does not impose either a contingent liability or financial obligation.
 - -- Offset achieved through placement of contracts with EPG industries.
 - --- 10% of procurement value of 650 USAF aircraft.
 - --- 40% of procurement value of all EPG aircraft.
 - --- 15% of procurement value of all third country sales.



- -- Procurement value to include aircraft flyaway cost, initial spares, Support Equipment (SE) Data, Training Equipment
 - --- Does not include replenishment spare parts

CURRENT STATUS:

Definitization and award of European sub-contracts behind schedule.

- -- Solutions found to most if not all problems.
 - --- European governments funded excess tooling costs outside of NTE cost.
 - --- Adjust exchange rates to reflect those on which the co-production **plan** established.
- -- Should permit implementation of approximately, 90-95% of CPP.
- -- Award of sub'-contracts to begin in July 76. General Dynamics will award final sub-contracts by early 77 Congress notified by letter on 22 Jun 76.
- Price of European F-16 is.expected to be within the estimated NTE cost of \$6.091 million (FY 75 dollars) stipulated in the MOU.
- -- Letter of Offer and Acceptance (LOA) delayed pending award of European sub-contracts and definition of costs.
- -- Preliminary contracts (signed in Jun.75) extended through end of 1976.
- -- Radar co-production plan revision in process.
 - --- Award of radar sub-contracts will be **later** than others. Radar **prime** contractor selected significantly later than the majority of other vendors (Nov 75).

- Audit Reports

-- Excessive time in auditing European sub-contract could cause further **delay in** contract awards.



- -- Correction action: Department of Defense Contract Audit Agency working closely with USAF and EPG auditors in arranging procedures for accelerating the Audit Reports.
- Release of European sub-contracts
 - -- US goalwasto activate at least one sub-contractor in each of the four countries by 1 July 1976, and sign all European co-production contracts by early 1977.
 - of last minute position change by United Technology' on F-100 pricing for engine sub-contract in Norway.
 - to-exceed price based only on Europe requirements.
 - --- United Technology now claims EPG F-100 notto-exceed, price is too low and is requesting, price be spread over all F-16 and F-15 buys. This is unacceptable to USG..
 - --- Commander, Aeronautical Systems Division and President, United Technology meeting in next few days to resolve issues.
 - --- A 10 July release date will protect F-16 co-production schedule.

SUMMARY:

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The problems associated with the F-16 co-production effort.' are typical and not unexpected for a program of this magnitude. Major issues are identified with actions underway to resolve them.

The Senior National Representatives to the F-16 Multinational Steering Committee Meeting as recently as 30 June 1976 had no major reservations about the status of the co,-production effort.

The F-16 program is on schedule and remains within the estimated not-to-exceed cost per aircraft 'of \$6.091 million.
